





Got a Cough or Cold? Use Honey, Study Says

What is the NHS?

- The NHS stands for the National Health Service. It was founded in 1948.
- It provides healthcare to everyone in the UK.

Next time you've got a cough or a cold you might want to make a beeline for the nearest supermarket and get yourself some ... honey!

A new study has suggested that honey may be better for easing coughs and colds than using antibiotics.

Antibiotics are a type of medicine sometimes given by doctors. They are used to treat some types of infections. However, according to the NHS, they do not work for "viral infections such as colds and flu."

The researchers looked at evidence from other trials. They saw that honey helped symptoms, such as sore throats, coughs and blocked noses.

Two of the trials even showed that people's symptoms got better 1-2 days faster if they used honey.


The scientists said that "honey was superior to usual care". They added that it is "widely available and cheap".

The NHS says that honey shouldn't be given to children under the age of 1. But, the next time you are feeling under the weather, remember that honey might be just what the doctor ordered!

Honey in History

Humans have known that honey is the bee's knees for thousands of years.

Stone Age paintings from around 8000 years ago are the earliest example of people collecting honey.



Pots of honey have been found in ancient Egyptian tombs. In fact, the very first records of beekeeping come from ancient Egyptian hierogluphs.

Ancient Greeks enjoyed putting honey in food but also used it as medicine. Some Greek coins even had bees on them!

The ancient Romans valued beekeeping and the use of honey too. A large number of bees were kept in Rome and other Roman towns and cities. However, so many people wanted honey that they had to import it from other parts of their empire.

Honeybees have even been into space! In 1984, NASA blasted some into orbit on a space shuttle to see how they built their honeycombs.




