

Gaming World Records



Many people, both children and adults, find gaming to be a fun way to wind down and catch up with friends. Whether it's getting competitive on a multiplayer sports game, going exploring with an adventure game, or getting creative with a world-builder game, there's plenty for everyone to enjoy. Some people love to shoot for the stars and put in the work to beat their own high scores and personal records, but did you know that there are real-life world records for gaming too? Here are some of the most impressive real-life high scores.

The largest games controller includes a 9 foot tall joystick!

Professor Mary Flanagan created this giant controller, which is almost 14 times the size of the original retro controller it was modelled after. It's so huge, it needs at least two people to operate it, but it works and you can play lots of fun arcade games.

The world's largest video game collection includes 20,139 games!

Antonio Romero Montero of Richmond, USA, started collecting games when he was aged 12 and never stopped! In fact, he has so many games, it took him 8 days just to count them all. Within his collection, he even has the complete catalogue of two game consoles available in North America.

The longest gaming marathon of all time is 138 hours and 34 seconds!

Don't try this at home! In 2015, Carrie Swidecki beat the previous record by playing a dancing game non-stop from July 11th to July 17th, raising over \$100,000 for charity.

The most button presses in 10 seconds is 78!

In 2011, Alex Cunningham made a video of himself pressing a single button on his controller 78 times in 10 seconds. I wouldn't want to face him on a fighting game!

The longest e-sports winning streak is 106 games!

Did you know that you can be a professional gamer? Vision Strikers, a Korean video gaming team who play competitively, managed to record zero losses between June 2020 and April 2021 within e-sports tournaments. That was made up of a very impressive 102 wins and 4 draws!

The youngest professional gamer signed a contract aged 7!

Back in 2005, Victor de Leon III signed his first professional gaming contract with Major League Gaming. He was only 7 years old and played under the screen name Lil Poison. He even had a movie made about him!
